16004 E. Jefferson

Voight- Kreit House c.1900. Wm. Voight was member of Detroit Board of Education 1890.

16638 E. Jefferson

Probably oldest brick house in Grosse Pointe. Built c 1849 of locally-made brick. Owned 1912-1976 by Harold Wardwells.

(3) 16939 E. Jefferson

Isadore Cadieux house. White clapboard farmhouse built mid-century by son of Michael Cadieux. One of oldest remaining Grosse Pointe houses.

4 11 Grosse Pointe Blvd

G.P. South High School.
Designed by George Haas
resembling Philadelphia's
Independence Hall. The tower is
the most distinguishing feature,
standing nearly 133 feet.

(5) 16 Lake Shore

G.P. Memorial Church. In 1894, the A Little Ivy Covered Church built here on land donated by Joseph H. Berry.

6 32 Lake Shore

G.P. War Memorial. Built in 1910 for Russell A. Alger, VP of Packard Motor Car called The Moorings. Branch of Detroit Institute of Arts from 1936-1948 before becoming a community center.

7 59 Lake Shore

Henry G. Sherrard house
Possibly early Albert Kahn
design. Built in 1892 by Joseph
Berry for his daughter Charlotte
and her husband a founder of
Detroit University School, now
University Liggett School.

(8) 71 Lake Shore

William A. McGraw house.
Originally the 1884 summer
home of McGraw. Called The
Poplars, entrance redesigned
for Percival Dodge in 1927
by Roger O. Derrick.

9 157 Lake Shore

St. Paul on the Lake Roman Catholic Church. Completed in 1899 for a parish with a heritage dating to the 1820's.

171 Lake Shore

Convent of the Sacred Heart-Grosse Pointe Academy. Designed by Wm. Shickel in 1885 for Academy of the Sacred Hart for Girls. Since 1969, a private, co-educational school

(11) 365 Lake Shore

John Wynne, Jr. Victorian Queen Anne style summer house. Built about 1896 for Wynne, a Detroit attorney.

(12) 625 Lake S<u>hore</u>

Harry Jewett house. Built in 1909 by Walter McFarlane for Jewett, head of Paige-Detroit Motor Car Co. originally used as a summer cottage.

13) 755 Lake Shore

Joseph Harris house. Farmhouse completed about 1880 by Harris for his wife, Catherine Vernier Harris. Though greatly altered, Queen Anne style trim on front gable remains. Part of the structure may date from the late 1770's when the Vernier family first settled on this property.

(14) 788 Lake Shore

Grosse Pointe Yacht Club.
Clubhouse designed by Boston
architect Guy Lowell. Opened
July 4, 1929. 188 foot flagpole
floated to Club by barge from
Rose Terrace, Mrs. Horace
Dodge's estate before it
was demolished.

1100 Lake Shore

Edsel & Eleanor Ford House. Albert Kahn design completed in 1929 for the Ford's. Interior paneling of 16th, 17th & 18th centuries. Estate bequeathed in 1976 for public tours and special events by Mrs. Ford

(16) 376 Kercheval

Provencal-Weir house. C. 1823. Grosse Pointe Historical Society Headquarters. Farmhouse built by Detroiter Pierre Provencal, an Indian agent turned farmer.
